PEI ready for annual conference

Event promotes minority business development

et to launch its 8th annual conference for minority business leaders, Partners for Economic Inclusion will this year bring one of the nation's leading experts in technology to the Port City for an interactive discussion on how businesses can increase revenue by "Bridging the Digital Divide."

Chancellor of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), Dr. Phillip L. Clay is the keynote speaker for the Partners conference to be held from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 8, 2006, at Cape Fear Community College's North Campus.

Dr. Clay is one of the two most senior academic officers of MIT and has responsibility for graduate and undergraduate education, student life and student services at the university. He has been a member of the faculty since 1975 and is widely known for his work in federal housing policy and community development. He has served as a member of the Policy and Research Advisory Councils of the Federal National Mortgage Association (Fannie Mae) and served as a consultant to many federal and state agencies and foundations.

"Knowing Professor Clay's background, we couldn't be happier to have a speaker of this caliber in Wilmington to challenge our minority business owners on ways today's technologies can be put to use for them," said Dr. Larry Clark, co-leader of Partners' Leadership Team.

Each year, Partners for Economic Inclusion hosts this conference for small and diverse business leaders with a keynote speaker who offers insight on current topics relevant to the business owner. At the same time, attendees are given opportunities to meet and get to know other business leaders, from both large and small organizations, so that relationships are begun that may lead to future business opportunities.

"It is our desire that conference attendees leave this workshop with a better understanding of Partners' mission to foster creative solutions to grow African-American businesses," said Louis Rogers, co-leader of Partners' Leadership Team. "We hope that they also take away new found knowledge from our speaker to start using in their companies right away."

Partners for Economic Inclusion's annual conference is open to the public at no charge. The conference is supported by many local companies and includes participation by Wilmington Mayor Spence Broadhurst, County Commissioners' Chairman Bobby Greer, Congressman Mike McIntyre and other local and state elected officials.
